
HUC NEWS BUTES



BOOK LAUNCH; GOD'S QUAD AND RELIGION & FAITH IN AFRICA




On Thursday, September 27, at the auditorium of Hekima University College were presented two books written by HUC lecturers; Gods Quad & Religion and Faith in Africa. Among the distinguished guests present was the rector of Hekima Jesuit Community, Fr. Deogratias Rwezaura, Sj, the principal of Hekima College, Fr. John Okoria, SJ, and Professor of African Christianity and religious studies at Kenyatta University (Nairobi, Kenya) Prof Philomena Mwaura,

The first book, Religion and Faith in Africa presented depicts the personal experience of Rev. Fr. Agbonkhianmeghe E. Orobator SJ, Chairman of HUC Board of Governors. According to Fr. Orobator, the book is drawn from his personal religious experience. He says, "I want to tell my story. There is a lot of stories in this book. I think that my way of doing theology is not going from concepts and try to distill some implications, but to withdraw from my own experience. Theology has to speak to real life."



The second book presented was written by several authors among whom are some young Kenyan Catholics. They share about their faith experience in small Christian communities. In their book published by Orbis Books, they provide some good insights for the next synod of bishops in Rome on "Youth, Faith and Vocational discernment from 3rd to 28 October, 2018". According to the authors, young people can deepen their faith through the creation of their own peer faith-sharing group without priests and religious. Online Christian communities are also important in order to influence the new generations and help them to be more involved in the Church.

The anxiety, excitement and tension; all this are familiar feelings most students getting ordained as deacons experience. On the 2nd of March 2019, candidates twenty-one were presented to The Church for Diaconate Ordination and candidate was presented to the church for priestly ordination.





This day marked another history on the grounds of Hekima College because it was the first time a priestly ordination and diaconate ordination were combined in one single celebration. The ordaining prelate was Rt. Rev Virgilio Pante, IMC (Bishop of Maralal Diocese in Kenya). He invited the deacons to the service of The Church.

Being ordained to the diaconate for Jesuits is a key part of formation that is required prior to priestly ordination. In the next few months, as part of their formation, some will proceed for pastoral work while others will undertake second cycle of studies, the new deacons will continue to gain pastoral experience over the next few months before being ordained to the catholic priesthood. They will proclaim the word of God, preach and preside at the sacraments of baptism and marriage and at the rite of a Christian burial.
